## Honourable Alfred Deakin (1856-1919)

Prime Minister 1903–1904, 1905–1908, 1909–1910; Legislator, Federalist and one of the Founders of the Constitution; held Liberal seat of West Bourke 1880–1889, Essendon 1889–1900; Attorney-General in the first Commonwealth Government, became Australia's second Prime Minister 1903–1904 after the resignation of Sir Edmund Barton.

**ADELAIDE AVE**: Adelaide, Capital of South Australia.

**BARRON ST:** *Major-General Sir Harry Barron* (1847–1921), Governor of Tasmania 1909–13, Western Australia 1913–17.

**BEALE CRES:** *Sir (Oliver) Howard Beale*, QC (1898–1983), diplomat, politician, lawyer and businessman.

BEAUCHAMP ST: Sir William Lygon (7th Earl Beauchamp) (1872–1938), Governor of New South Wales 1899–1901.

**BEDFORD ST:** Admiral Sir Frederick George Denham Bedford (1838–1913), Governor of Western Australia 1903–09.

**BRASSEY ST:** *Thomas Brassey* (1st Earl Brassey) (1836–1918), Governor of Victoria 1895–1900.

**BUXTON ST:** *Sir Thomas Fowell Buxton* (1837–1915), Governor of South Australia 1895–99.

CAIRNS ST: Sir William Wellington
Cairns (c1828–1888), Governor of Queensland
1875–77.

CAMPION ST: Colonel Sir William Robert Campion, KCMG, DSO, KG, StJ (1870–1951), Governor of Western Australia 1924–31.

CANTERBURY CRES: Viscount
Canterbury (Sir John Manners-Sutton)
(1814-1877), Governor of Victoria 1866-73.

CARMICHAEL ST: Sir Thomas
Carmichael (1st Baron of Skirling)
(1859–1926), Governor of Victoria 1908–11.

CARRINGTON ST: The Right Hon. Charles Robert Wynn Carrington, (Marquess of Lincolnshire) (1843–1928), Governor of New South Wales 1885–90.

CARRUTHERS ST: Sir Joseph Hector McNeil Carruthers, KCMG (1857–1932), Member Legislative Assembly, New South Wales 1887–1907; Delegate to Federal Convention 1897–98. Premier 1904–07.

CHERMSIDE ST: Lieutenant General Sir Herbert Charles Chermside (1850-1929), Governor of Queensland 1902-04.

**DALY ST:** *Sir Dominick Daly* (1798–1868), Governor of South Australia 1862–68.

de CHAIR ST: Admiral Sir Dudley Rawson Stratford de Chair (1864–1958), Governor of New South Wales 1924–30.

**DENISON ST:** *Sir William Thomas* **Denison** (1804–1871), Governor of Tasmania 1847–55 and of New South Wales 1855–61.

**DOMINION CIRC:** The Dominions of the British Commonwealth.

**DUFF PL:** *Sir Robert William Duff* (1835–1895), Governor of New South Wales 1893–95.

**DUGAN ST:** *Major-General Sir Winston Joseph Dugan*, Governor of South Australia 1934–39, of Victoria 1939–49.

**EMPIRE CIRC**: The British Empire.

**FERGUSSON CRES:** *Sir James Fergusson*, *Bart.* (1832–1907), Governor of South Australia 1869–73; influenced the securing of the route of the overland telegraph line through the Northern Territory to Port Augusta.

**FULLER ST:** *Sir John Michael Fleetwood Fuller* (1864–1915), Governor of Victoria 1911–14.

Sir George Warburton Fuller (1861–1943), Member New South Wales Legislative Assembly 1889–94; Member of House of Representatives 1901–03; Minister for Home Affairs 1909–10; Member Legislative Assembly, New South Wales 1915–28, Premier 1922–25.

**GALWAY PL:** *Sir Henry Lionel Galway* (1859–1949), Governor of South Australia 1914–20.

**GAWLER CRES:** *Colonel George Gawler* (1795-1869), Governor of South Australia 1838-41.

GEILS CT: Major Andrew Geils (c1776–1843), Military Officer; arrived Sydney 1811; appointed by Governor Macquarie as Commandant to administer the Hobart Town settlement from 20 February 1812 to 4 February 1813.

**GORMANSTON CRES:** *The Rt Hon Viscount Gormanston* (1837–1907), Governor of Tasmania 1893–1900.

**GREY ST:** *Sir George Grey* (1812–1898), Governor of South Australia 1841–45, explored north west Australia in 1837–39.

GROSE ST: Francis Grose (c1758-1814), first Commander of New South Wales Corps 1789; Lieutenant Governor of New South Wales 1790-92; Acting-Governor 1792-94.

**HAMPDEN PL:** *Sir Henry Robert Brand Hampden* (1841–1906), Governor of New South Wales (1895–99); 2nd Viscount Hampden.

**HANNAH PL:** *Sir Colin Thomas Hannah*, KCM, CB, CBE (1914–1978), Governor of Queensland 1972–77; Chief of Air Staff RAAF 1970–72.

HOPETOUN CIRC: Earl of Hopetoun (John Adrian Louis Hope) (1860–1908), first Governor-General of the Commonwealth 1901–03 and Governor of Victoria 1889–95.

**HOTHAM CRES:** *Sir Charles Hotham,* RN (1806–1855), Lieutenant Governor of Victoria 1854–55.

JERSEY ST: The Rt Hon Victor Albert George Child Villiers, Earl of Jersey (1845–1915), Governor of New South Wales 1891–93. JERVOIS ST: Lieutenant General Sir William Jervois (1821–1897), Governor of South Australia 1877–83.

**KENT ST:** *HRH Duke of Kent* was to become Governor-General but this did not eventuate owing to the outbreak of war 1939, and his death on August 1942, in a plane crash.

KING ST: Captain Phillip Gidley King, RN (1758–1808), Governor of New South Wales 1800–06.

Admiral Phillip Parker King, RN (1791–1856), hydrographer; completed exploration of Australian coast 1817–18.

LAMINGTON ST: Lord Lamington, 2nd Baron (1860–1940), Governor of Queensland 1896–1901; it is claimed that a cake covered in chocolate and coconut is named after Lord Lamington.

**LATROBE PARK:** *Charles Joseph Latrobe* (1801–1875), Superintendent of Port Phillip District and Lieutenant Governor of Victoria 1839–54.

LAWLEY PL: LAWLEY ST: Sir Arthur Lawley (6th Baron Wenlock) (1860–1932), Governor of Western Australia 1901–02.

**LE HUNTE ST:** *Sir George Ruthven Le Hunte* (1852–1925), Governor of South Australia 1903–09.

MACARTNEY CRES: The Rt Hon Sir William Macartney (1852–1924), Governor of Tasmania 1913–17, Western Australia 1917–20.

MacGREGOR ST: The Rt Hon Sir William MacGregor (1846–1919), Governor of Queensland 1909–14.

MAKIN PL: Norman John Oswald Makin, OA (1889-1982), diplomat and politician; MHR Hindmarsh 1919-46; Member Advisory War Council 1940; Minister for Aircraft Production 1943–46; MHR Bonython 1956–63, for Sturt 1954–56; Minister for Navy and Munitions 1941–43; First Ambassador to United States of America 1946–51; First President United Nations Security Council 1946, President 1947.

**MELBOURNE AVE:** Melbourne, Capital of Victoria.

NAPIER CL: Sir John Mills Napier, KCMG (1882–1976), Lieutenant Governor of South Australia 1942–63; Chief Justice for 25 years; Chancellor University of Adelaide 1946–61; Judge Supreme Court South Australia 1924–67; Member Federal Royal Commission of Banking 1936–37.

NATHAN ST: Sir Matthew Nathan (1862–1939), Governor of Queensland 1920–25.

NATIONAL CIRC: The Nation.

**NEWDEGATE ST:** *Sir Francis Alexander Newdegate* (1862–1936), Governor of Western Australia 1920–24.

NORMAN PL: NORMAN ST: Field Marshal Sir Henry Wylie Norman (1826-1904), Governor of Queensland 1889-95.

NORMANBY CRES: Marquess of Normanby (1819–1890), Governor of Queensland 1871–74 and Victoria 1879–84; signed Ned Kelly's death warrant.

**NORTHCOTE CRES:** *Baron Northcote* (1846–1911), Governor-General of the Commonwealth 1904–08.

**PHIPPS CL:** George Augustus Constantine Phipps, KCMG, GCMG, GCB (1819–1890), Governor of Queensland 1871–84 and Victoria 1879–84; 2nd Marquess of Normandy.

RAWSON ST: Admiral Sir Harry Holdsworth Rawson (1843–1910), Governor of New South Wales 1902–09. **RED HILL DR:** *Red Hill*, name associated with the area since the days of the early settlers.

**ROBE ST:** *Lieutenant Colonel Frederick Holt Robe* (1802–1871), Lieutenant Governor of South Australia 1845–48.

**STATE CIRCLE:** The States of the Commonwealth.

**STONEHAVEN CRES: Viscount Stonehaven** (Sir John Lawrence Baird) (1874–1941), Governor-General 1925–30.

**STRADBROKE ST:** *Earl of Stradbroke* (1862–1947), Governor of Victoria 1921–26.

STRICKLAND CRES: Sir Gerald Strickland (1861–1940), Governor of Tasmania 1904–09, Western Australia 1909–13 and New South Wales 1913–17. THESIGER CT: Frederic John Napier Thesiger (1st Viscount Chelmsford), KCMG, GCMG, PC, GCSI, GCIE, GBE (1868–1933), Governor of Queensland 1905–09 and New South Wales 1909–13; Viceroy of India 1916; returned to England and created Viscount 1921; First Lord of the Admiralty in Ramsay MacDonald's Labour Ministry of 1924; Agent-General for New South Wales 1926–28.

YARRA GLEN: Name of an early homestead in Woden district; the site is now within Division of Hughes.
